I am very concerned about the Bruce Mirkin case that many of you may have read about in The Village Voice or elsewhere. Bruce is a San Francisco journalist who has worked on issues of importance to our community for a long time including that of Gay youth. He communicated online with a supposedly Gay teenager and set up a meeting to investigate the story when he stumbled into a Sacramento police sting operation. I had no doubt that Bruce is totally innocent and that will be proven. However with cases like this there are enormous legal costs to clear his name. Bruce has done a lot for us so I am asking you all to contribute to The Bruce Mirkin Legal Defense Fund at once at PO Box 14954, San Francisco, CA 94114. Send checks today!

As you know I consider myself a theatre activist and sometimes just an activist. I want to tell you the good, the bad, and the ugly about GLAAD. First our hardworking theatre committee under the direction of Jim Talbot ended its session for the 10th Annual Media Awards. There were some surprises and the nominees are "A Gay Christmas Carol," "Burning Blue," "Heaven and Home," "The Last Session," and "Thorn." Kudos to the nominated productions. I must say that I felt that Celebration Theatre's shows "Naked Boys Singing," and "Clean" were first-rate productions and should have been nominated as well.

The ugly news is that GLAAD has accepted money from COORS. The Boycott Committee has rightly deplored this action. It denies the fact that despite any insignificant steps the Coors company has taken in their employment policies the principal owners are pouring large amounts of Coors profits into the hands of people who hate us and want to kill us. If GLAAD and the other groups that accept this blood money don't realize this, they are indeed shortsighted or greedy. If Coors gets into the Gay bar business there will be millions in profits that will end up in the hands of our enemies.

I strongly urge Joan M. Garry and GLAAD to return this money and to change their policies and become the watchdog for our community that they once were. # A GAY AMERICAN PLAYWRIGHT IN LONDON Party, 1998 — by David Dillon

There are three great milestones in every play's life – opening in New York, Los Angeles, and London. 1995 brought me the first two but it was the last which proved, just recently, to be the sweetest.

As an American playwright going to London for the rehearsals and opening of my play, Party, I had apprehensions. I wondered how the script would translate to an UK audience. Many of the references are decidedly American, and we needed to "localize" it for a British crowd. Our director, Andrew Neil, began his homework early by lunching in London with American musical star Donna McKechnie who went through the script with him to identify references he didn't understand ("Jenny Craig?"). Then, Andrew and I phoned and faxed until we came up with an initial working script. It's funny that changes I thought were musts weren't at all. I'd added Elaine Paige to a list of gay goddesses of the stage and screen and was adamantly vetoed by the cast. They claimed that Miss Paige would never be considered a stage goddess by any tasteful London fag, but Petula Clark had to be included. Who knew? During rehearsals, I would do rewrites over fish and chips in pubs in Covent Garden near our rehearsal hall. I could have stayed forever.

We were set for a limited run of seven weeks at the Arts Theatre in the West End where *Waiting for Godot* was originally produced and Peter Hall began the experimental wing of the RSC. It was wonderful to be surrounded by such history. I loved the cast instantly. I was terrified that there would be some I felt were totally wrong, but there wasn't one I'd have chosen differently. My biggest concern is always the character of Ray, the priest. The danger always exists that the actor will wear a neon sign on his forehead shouting "child molester" — my greatest fear. I was thrilled to see that the director had understood the line one needs to walk with that character and had chosen brilliantly. Each and every one of them was a gem — both as actors and as people. I loved that cast and never wanted to leave.

The producer was a dream (and I don't think those words have *ever* come out of my mouth before). A disgustingly young man, Andrew Christian will be a major driving force in gay theatre in London. He was honest, did everything right and was a total delight. Andrew Neil was as caring a director as one could wish for. He treated the play with respect and cared that the vision he created was the vision I intended. I wonder why every experience we have can't be as perfect as this one was.

Some reviews were mixed, but the box office boomed whether a notice was positive or negative. Of particularly sleazy note is the fact that the openly gay critic for the *Evening Standard* tore us to shreds and then brought a group of friends to have a rollicking good time a couple of weeks later. As is so often the case in gay theatre, much was made of the nudity. Homophobic journalists put it down while wetting themselves over Nicole Kidman in *The Blue Room* blocks away. Audiences loved it and the consensus was that it didn't feel

like an American play in London; it felt local and timely. A tribute to the collective efforts of all concerned.

Before the run ended, *Party* had become the most successful play at the Arts since "Godot." There are plans now for a twelve-city UK tour to begin in the spring with a return to the West End in the fall. Now, if every experience could just be this good.
