This Issue is dedicated to our Community's Playwrights, who are the lifeblood of our Movement. I salute the people who write the words that move and entertain us. Currently there is a 20th anniversary production of Martin Sherman's BENT and February, 2000 will be the 20th anniversary of Jane Chambers' LAST SUMMER AT BLUEFISH COVE. Director Francine L. Trevens envisions East Coast productions of COVE to celebrate that milestone in Lesbian theatre. Contact her at SHELLEYFT@aol.com or 212-726-6279. Another event which impressed me further about the power of playwrights was The Ivy Theatre's reading of LETTERS HOME by Dee Jae Cox about the witchhunt of Lesbians in the military. The raw emotion of the piece moved the entire audience in a packed theatre in West Hollywood. I also note that Michael Mann's BOX 27 which won the GLAAD award for LA Theatre a few years ago will have a New York production at Wings, as will James Rosenfield's timely ADAM'S WEDDING. Also exciting was a one-night production of Mart Crowley's FOR REASONS THAT REMAIN UNCLEAR with Philip Anglim and Keene Curtis in Los Angeles.

The threats and censorship both external and self-imposed continued around the country. The National Campaign for Freedom of Expression is approaching its 10th anniversary and is needed more than ever. They have a new handbook on responding to challenges to artistic freedom. Speaking of freedom, I am happy to report that Bruce Mirkin has been vindicated in court and now he will be able to concentrate on his important journalism rather than fighting police entrapment.

In this Issue we have further discussion of play publication and distribution post-Dialogus. We need volunteer correspondents in most parts of the world including New York City, Atlanta, and abroad to either write or clip and send information.

Another important development is the formation of The Pink Network (Le Reseau Rose) which plans to unify a Canadian-Quebecois network of groups/artists/theatres to promote Queer Art in Canada. Check out www.out.ca and congratulations to OUT Productions and David Allan King on this grand endeavor!

ONE Institute/International Gay and Lesbian Archives' new building is nearing completion. It will house many special collections including The Performing Arts, of which I am the Director, at 909 W Adams in Los Angeles near the University Of Southern California campus. I am in the midst of an Appeal to finish the room and The Purple Circuit will be producing a fundraising event "Tea With Oscar And Gertrude" on October 16,1999 to celebrate Oscar Wilde's birthday. This program will be repeated next year, while in the meantime sections from this production will be toured to high schools and colleges. When the Joseph Jefferson Awards for non-union theatres were handed out AFT became King (Queen?) of the Hill winning the most, four for Dream Boy (best production, director and sound and lighting designs) and one for Kyle Hall's adaptation of A Home at the End of the World. In addition, AFT produced a successful and beautiful production of Caryl Churchill's Cloud Nine. Can they possibly get any more annoying?

This year's Pride Series at The Bailiwick is perhaps one of their most successful, both audience and critic wise. Its twin productions of the new age musical, Breathe by Dan Martin and Michael Biello, and Homme Fatale: The Joey Stefano Story (the Australian hit by Barry Lowe) have so boffo'd the press and the box office, they've been extended. Not too surprising a description for a drama about Mr. Stefano when you think about it, and how apropos that this play comes from down under, too.

Still to come, Damage & Desire by Kate Moira Ryan, a tale of two sisters (the Dickens, you say), and a literary magazine, and Scent of Rain by Mark Dunn, starring Ryan (bigger than a breadbasket) Idol, a comedy about a father and two sons trying to find a "husband" for the third son before the father dies. As a side note, after rehearsal one night, Idol was fag bashed when he finished dining with a friend. He seemed to have given as good as he got to his assailants, but the report stated that the police had no interest in tracking down the goons.

theatreQ continues its readings of new works by gay / lesbian / transgender writers in its series The Stories of Our Lives. They also performed several of these works for the audience at Edgewater Days, a community street fair, and the location of the Gerber/Hart

QUEERFEST REPORT

from BIRMINGHAM, U.K. By Tim Miller

I'm feeling really good about the gay men's performance project I did in England (festively titled SUCK SPIT CHEW SWALLOW!) I think it came together very powerfully. It is very challenging to work so quickly with a group of performers (and non-performers) to make something come to life. The piece really came to be about desire and disaster I think. All this aspiration to love and for companionship ... surrounded by the bombs without and within. The piece began with five men sleeping in the space surrounded by a haunting ambient score with a collage of snippets from the groups' stories of very intimate moments they had had with other men. The musician I collaborated with created a great score for the show full of sampled bits of interviews of the performers.

I was also working with a video artist and we collaborated on a wonderful video sequence for the show. It was the most multi-media I have been in years! The piece marked the men's stories of their bodies, search for love, the challenge of the many obstacles (and the bombs like the one in the bar in Soho!) that the world tosses in our way. Kuli, a young Indian man did a great piece about coming out during the rehearsal process and going to a gay club for the first time after our fifth workshop. I did a piece about getting a bottle thrown at me in Montana two years ago when I was performing at Montana Pride in Bozeman during a time when Alistair was being refused a visa by the US government. Ken, a Jamaican man, did a great piece about being invisible in gay culture as a middle-aged man of color. It felt pretty strong. Ian McKellen came up and saw it, which was so sweet and tickled the performers to no end!

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SOUTHERN CALIFORNIA THEATRE by Bill Kaiser

Lots of productions this summer in Los Angeles, San Diego, and surrounding areas. Lesbian Theatre got a big jolt from The Ivy Theatre on three fronts: co-production with Celebration Theatre of "Short & Sexy," an evening of brief romantic encounters by Lesbian playwrights Jennifer Swiatek, Pamela Gray, Sharyn Blumenthal, Pam Raines, and Sibyl O.Malley brought that -- and more -especially to those unfamiliar with Lesbian passion on stage. Later that week in August was LETTERS HOME by Dee Jae Cox, an emotion-packed evening about a Lesbian witch-hunt in the military, and the devastating results. Ivy also had a co-production with Highways and 6@Penn's San Diego hit THE DYKE AND THE PORN STAR by Bayla Travis. This was a stunning tour-de-force with captivating performances by Gayle Feldman and Veronica Hart. The Ivy continues their sweep with "Crossroads/Intersections playing in Sept, 1999 at The Village in Hollywood with three works: GOODBYE, CONEY ISLAND by Roz Winter and Janet Alessandro; GHOST AND THE SPIRIT by Pat Alderete and THE POLITICS OF

ME-SUNG AND UNSUNG with Barbara Roberts. Brava to The Ivy! and the other Theatres involved. A fourth show running in LA was REAL GIRLS with comics Robin Greenspan and Lacie Harmon.

Another genre that has taken LA by storm is the Drag/Camp one. Charles Busch is starring in the fab thriller DIE MOMMY DIE! at the Coast Playhouse where it has been extended to the end of September, 1999. I believe that the hit WHEN PIGS FLY by Howard Crabtree has some drag; at The Coronet. And then MISS COCO PERU is showing us her UNIVERSE at The Beverly Hills Playhouse, and nearby at The Court Theatre MISS DESMOND BEHIND BARS by Mark Goff, Marc Ian Sklar, Gregory Messer, David Bouzas and Leo Savalas is wooing them in the aisles.

Some personnel news: Richard Israel from West Coast Ensemble has become Artistic Director of Celebration Theatre with Jill Moore as Managing Director. Richard plans to continue Bob Schrock's practice of presenting original plays and new playwrights but he also wants to make Celebration the first stop for G/L plays that have premiered in New York. He hopes to present work that will illuminate the G/L community for crossover audiences. His first production will be a male version sanctioned by Sondheim of MARRY ME A LITTLE opening in mid-October, 1999.

Wayne Tibbetts has established himself as Artistic Director of Diversionary Theatre in San Diego with a goal of expanding the mission of the theatre to crossover shows. He eventually would like Diversionary to become an Equity theatre. Diversionary currently is presenting Tom Jacobson's CYBERQUEER.

I have also received two letters on the subject of play publication by Francine L. Trevens of T'n'T Books and Playwright Doric Wilson.

From Ms.Trevens:

As President of T'n'T Classics Inc., I understand John Dunn's problem. It lies not in the bookstores but in gay book buyers. Bookstores stock books to sell, not sit on shelves for years.

We find through direct contact with gay readers, and at annual book fairs, how reluctant they are to read a play. They think they are only to be seen. Until the gay community supports play publishers and bookstores there is no way to get decent distribution for plays. Samuel French, Applause, Drama Bookstore, Barnes and Noble and Amazon.com have always bought 'the leaders" on our list. But for example, The Oscar Wilde Bookstore and A Different Light have NEVER purchased any of our books despite mailings, phone calls, and personal visits. We sell more books to colleges than to gay bookstores or gay theatre companies.

Ms.Trevens also offers suggestions to improve this situation. Gay community centers should stock all the gay plays, theatres should purchase copies rather than illegally copy them, gay book clubs should list, gay readers should ask their bookstores to stock and then buy and read gay plays, and groups of friends could have "read a-louds" of plays. She and her partner Maggie Trask should be commended for trying to keep some of our classic plays in print. Mr. Wilson writes also:

A recent check of gay and lesbian bookstores in New York City for some of the major contributors to our dramatic literature proved "fruitless." The plays of Robert Patrick, Jane Chambers, Robert Chesley, Victor Bumbalo, Harvey Fierstein, etc., were nowhere to be found, forget looking for newer, less well known writers. Oscar (the quintessential closet case) Wilde was there with a copy of IDEAL HUSBAND. An important play if you are in the market for a "beard."

When staff were questioned, they patiently explained to me that these writers did not exist. When I, with equal patience, explained

that, yes these writers did exist, the staff less patiently, informed that as "they" had not heard of these "so-called" writers, they couldn't be of any "importance."

Politics also enter into the picture. For more than twenty years, bookstores on both coasts have refused to carry my plays because female employees object to my leather lifestyle. I know of one bookstore that had a "weenie" roast with one of Robert Chesley's hard core entertainments. It is interesting that "straight bookstores (Drama Bookstore in NYC, French's in LA, etc., and amazon.com could happily supply all the titles I asked for.

Doric Wilson plans to help the problem of play distribution by reviving TOSOS (his gay theatre company from the '70s) as a Web site under the name: TOSOS Too in the near future.
