### THE MEMORIAM ISSUE

#### **WELCOME TO ON THE PURPLE CIRCUIT!**

This is our last issue of the 20th century! It has been a rewarding 8 years of reporting on the activities of The Purple Circuit that is all of you! The Purple Circuit (for newcomers) is an informal network which exists to promote, nurture and preserve GLQBT culture especially theatre and performance.

This Issue is in Memoriam to our Brothers and Sisters who have left us. Especially since AIDS, we have lost a generation of writers, performers and artists of all kinds. Our culture has been profoundly affected. I am heartened to know that there are still individuals and groups creating for the future. As an archivist I am committed to preserving our culture and the memory of these special people. So I wish us all to remember them and their work. The latest is Quentin Crisp who died in his sleep at 90 while on tour with his one-man show in England.

I am concerned that World AIDS Day has gotten so low key in my area and also that plays seem to go out of their way to avoid mentioning AIDS at all. I had a serious discussion with Beto Araiza about this subject. He continues touring the country with his powerful piece H.I.VATO, but playing at conferences and colleges where there is still great interest. I see a lot of theatre and it is a great surprise for me that AIDS was a major theme of Luis Alfaro's remarkable new play STRAIGHT AS A LINE.

Another person who deserves credit for not forgetting is Producer David Reid whose organization AIDS WATCH broadcast the names of those who need to be remembered on Dec. 1 on cable stations and online throughout the world at www.aidswatch.org. Bravo to David and all who work with him on this important project. AIDS is not over either in our cultural community or sub-Saharan Africa.

I specifically want to remember some creative people that touched my life and that of The Purple Circuit. A founding member was Playwright James (Jim) Carroll Pickett, who set up our early issues, Michael Stuart Shere, David Stebbins and Joe Fraser, Robert Chesley, Wilson DiPalma (who starred in GUNSEL that I produced), and the talented Vincent Barron. There are certainly many, many others from AIDS and not who have an important memory for me: Chuck Rowland, the founder of Celebration Theatre, dear Jim Kepner, Martin Block and Ernie Potvin, all creative stalwarts of Celebration Theatre and The International Gay and Lesbian Archives. I miss them all more than I can say.

In this issue, we have columns by Tom W Kelly, Howard Casner and Gerald Semas who have written for OTPC for a long time and we welcome Marian Jones with a book review and Barry Lowe who has sent a lot of information about Australia. There are recurring topics that continue to concern The Purple Circuit and me. One is the treatment of playwrights by producers and the other is censorship and acts on artistic freedom through de-funding and other violent means. Art in the broadest sense can be powerful and our playwrights are that voice of art. Their names should never be left off press releases, flyers, or programs. They deserve respect as does their work in regards to changing it and responding to it timely. Likewise playwrights need to appreciate the immense effort producing their work entails for producers and both should cooperate!

Regarding censorship, several cases come to mind recently. One is Mayor Guliani's efforts to censor The Brooklyn Museum Of Art's exhibit "Sensation". You can still write to the Mayor at City Hall, New York NY 10007. Another much less publicized case is that of Raymond Caldwell and The Texas Shakespeare Festival in Kilgore, Texas. Because Mr. Caldwell decided to go ahead with a production

of ANGELS IN AMERICA -- with the support of Kilgore College president William M. Holda -- he and the production were attacked by the homophobic community. And the Gregg Country Board of Commissioners voted not to fund \$50,000 for Mr. Caldwell's ongoing pet project, The Texas Shakespeare Festival, an highlight of the cultural community of East Texas! I urge you to do what you can to help support this Festival. President Holda asks people to publicize the actions of the County commissioners and for help in restoring the funds needed for the Festival as well as suggest other funding sources. On some positive notes -- Out North, which had its funding killed in Anchorage two years ago, has received a \$14,000 grant from the current city Assembly on an 11-0 vote. Kudos to the city of Anchorage and Out North. Another brava goes to Marjorie Conn who received recognition from the National Gay and Lesbian Task Force for her work in theatre in Provincetown. She and her Conn Artist Performance Event provide a risk free experience for any performer that wants to come on board. I also congratulate David King and his compatriots at Out Productions in Montreal for creating The Pink Network [www.out.ca]. They have patterned themselves a bit after The Purple Circuit and provide information and communication throughout Canada to support our culture.

Charles Lago and Chip Snell, Authors On Tour Productions who produced Quentin Crisp's show are forming The Quentin Crisp Foundation which will help gender-confused youth, a cause near and dear to Mr. Crisp. There will be a talent-studded Benefit held on Friday, Jan. 21, 2000 at The Village, Ed Gould Plaza, 1125 n McCadden Pl. in LA. For tickets call The Village, 323-860-7300. For Foundation information, 619-497-0203. Bravo to Charles and Chip!

As to the future of The Purple Circuit, we will continue into the new Millennium. We hope to go online in one form or another. ### CHICAGO SCENE

They say that pride goeth before the fall, but in Bailiwick Repertory's instance, it's not only literally true, it extended into that period as well. Two productions of its annual gay-themed Pride series of plays, down under Barry Lowe's "Homme Fatale: The Joey Stefano Story," and Mark Dunn's ("let's take off all our clothes, and go down to the swimmin' hole," Ryan Idol vehicle) "Scent of Rain," were so successful, they were both extended through the early parts of September. Due to the runaway success of these plays and the early arrival of Greg Louganis in Larry Kramer's newly revised "Just

Say No", box office revenues were up 400% over any previous series, and subscription renewals are up 43%. In addition, Byron S. Stewart, the tour de force of "Conversation with a Diva," was nominated for a Black Theatre Award for performance. And I guess you just can't keep 'em down, either. "Big Dicks on Stage," Steve Dawson's dramady about a playwright asked to compromise his artistic vision and put nudity in his show, recently opened at Bailiwick and seems an appropriate coda to all that has come before it.

Fred Solari has the sort of problems most theatre's dream of: two successful productions that need to be extended, but not enough space to house them both. So he'll take a page from Gilbert and Sullivan's Box and Cox and use the same theatre, sort of Athenaeum and Porchlight Theatre Company's "Falsettos" was managing quite well on a stage with the audience on either side. Then Ulysses Theatre screwed things up by making a huge hit of Larry Kramer's "The Normal Heart", so Solari solved the problem by erecting another stage in a corner of the room. On the nights that "Falsettos" is nothing more than a mere basso, half the seats will be turned to face the new stage. Both mother and child seem to be doing nicely in this arrangement.

Solari's not the only one having to deal with the stress of success. Northlight Theatre is moving south with their production of Jeff Baron's "Visiting Mr. Green", a drama about a gay man ordered to visit an older man after nearly running him over (I guess "What's your sign" just doesn't work like it used to). It will be remounted at the more spacious Royal George Theatre where everyone is praying for a fruitful (no pun intended) run.

### BOOK REVIEW

In this day of "non-labels" Carolyn Gage offers the acting world a non-apologetic (thank goodness) book - MONOLOGUES & SCENES FOR LESBIAN ACTORS. The introduction alone is inspiring. Carolyn's passion for lesbian artists is evident.

As an actor looking for a scene or monologue Carolyn's book has a myriad of opportunities. She has offered a character index, which breaks the scenes down by age, ethnicity, economic background, regional background as well as sexual abuse, fat, male, butch and anorectic. Her monologues vary from Joan of Arc speaking to a modern day audience to a 19-year-old lesbian camp counselor and her struggles with attractions as well as losing her job. We are then offered the wonderful Charlotte Cushman monologue of her encounter with death in bed with a prostitute and the fabulous Calamity Jane speaking to her daughter. These are rich monologues any actress would be fortunate to work on, straight or lesbian. These characters need to be seen and heard on the stage. Carolyn has given all actors this opportunity.

The scene portion of the book did nothing but wet my appetite for the full lengths (which I will find and read). Again, we are given the opportunity to reach inside some moments in time that offer a glimpse we often, or I should say, never see. Harriet Tubman defending herself to her modern day therapist, on the Isle of Lesbos we see Atthis attempt to kiss Anactoria for the first time at the temple of Aphrodite. We get to meet The Amazon All Stars and see a scene between a lesbian separatist Maria from Westside Story and a prostitute-rights activist Aldonza from Man of La Mancha. This is just a small portion of what MONOLOGUES & SCENES FOR LESBIAN ACTORS has to offer.

Carolyn's imagination and her richness of dialogue are a wonderful offering to a theatre community that could certainly use a push in the direction of representing US ALL on the stage. As the Artistic Director of a lesbian focused theatre company (LA's IVY THEATRE COMPANY), I appreciate Carolyn's efforts in that direction and have a sense of comfort knowing that she is OUT THERE.
