## WELCOME TO ON THE PURPLE CIRCUIT!

We exist to promote GLQBT theatre and performance throughout the world and invite you to join in that endeavor!

This is the Sidney Morris Issue. Sidney is one of our pioneer Gay playwrights. Based in New York his plays are part of our culture and still available for production. While in poor health, he is still writing and has an important message for producers in his article DO US! in this issue. He also is the first interviewee of my Oral History Project and I thank him for that (as well as Tom O'Neil who did the interview and Ty Wilson who did the camerawork).

As you know I believe in theatre and activism. Briefly I want to mention four issues: GLAAD, US Immigration, Censorship and Treatment Of Playwrights. First, I want to follow-up about GLAAD's accepting \$100,000 grant from Coors. Here on the West Coast there has been a boycott of Coors in the GL bars for years, first because of their labor policies toward GL employees and now because members of the Coors family that get the profits give money to our mortal enemies. A lot of GL groups have started to accept Coors money, which is a ploy to break the boycott and get that GL bar money. I, and others, wrote to Joan Garry, ED of GLAAD about this issue. Instead of discussing it, GLAAD made it known they would not discuss it further, period. And this from a group that promotes dialogue in the show biz industry. Their arrogance has made me not renew my membership. In the meantime I was on the theatre subcommittee. I voiced my opinions when asked by email to volunteer for a GLAAD event. The powers that be there tried to dismiss me from the committee before the voting year was over. They did not try to dismiss me because I violated the rules of the theatre committee but because they will not tolerate dissent.

Another issue that has come to the forefront is US Immigration policy toward binational same sex couples. This is the heart of Tim Miller's wrenching new piece GLORY BOX where he and his Australian partner Alistair will be facing the decision of what country they can live in. Another example for our theatre world is that of Charles Lago and Chip Snell. They have operated theatres in San Diego and Los Angeles and produced many plays for the purple circuit community. Charles is being deported to England. Congressman Nadlor is sponsoring a bill to change INS policy. An ongoing issue is censorship of the arts. CORPUS CHRISTI is an example with the outrageous imposition of a fatwah against Terrence McNally after the London production. Also closer to home was the difficulty that Daylight Zone had in finding a space for their production-Kudos to Theatre Double in Philadelphia for providing space!

Lastly I want to speak again about the treatment of Playwrights. We would have no productions without them. I really feel that PC theatres have to be as responsible as straight ones about scripts. If you have a staff shortage-find some volunteers to either read for you or send unsolicited scripts back in their SASEs in a reasonable length of time. I know that Producers have their share of woes too and we all have to work together to keep the excitement and creativity of our culture flowing.

I join in mourning the passing of Maggie Task and Ted Bales. I commend former AD of Theatre Rhinoceros, Adele Prandini for all her important work in San Francisco and former literary manager of The Ivy Theatre, Mary Casey for her vision in starting a Lesbian theatre in Los Angeles with Marian Jones and nurturing our city's playwrights.

This past year saw many new plays in Los Angeles including Luis Alfaro's intriguing next generation AIDS play STRAIGHT AS A LINE; William Hoffman's RIGA, Bayla Travis' THE DYKE AND THE PORN STAR; Celebration's staging of TOO OLD FOR THE CHORUS, a musical revue that touches on ageism in our community; the male version of Sondheim's MARRY ME A LITTLE; and my favorite production of the year, VOLUPTUOUS MADNESS with the Fabulous Monsters. This year has great promise too with the Ivy's staging of Dee Jae Cox's LETTERS HOME, an emotionally moving account of a Lesbian witch hunt in the military which shouldn't be missed!

This issue of OTPC is a little more compact as our funds are limited. Please, if you receive a subscription notice, renew at once or if you aren't a subscriber become one today! #### **CHICAGO SCENE**

Enough about me, let's talk about you. What do you think of me? Since it's my column and I'll write about me if I want to, and since so much is happening for moi, I thought I'd start off with the Department of Self-Agrandizement rather than end with it. First, I'm very proud that Bailiwick's Pride will be staging my romantic ghost story, Endless Night/Sweet Delight, on its main stage beginning May 25. Before that, April 4 will see Potter Productions opening three of my one-acts, A Cold Coming We Had Of It, A Misreading of Camus and A Little Lear and Laundry. Finally, West Coast Ensemble in LA will also be doing A Misreading of Camus in April.

Continuing with Bailiwick, David Zak reports he is expecting at least 15 events for Pride this year. Not everything has been finalized, but so far there are three new plays by Chicagoans: mine plus Work Out, a comedy byRussell Glidden and Ron Rigby, and Bare, Brian Kirst's explosive look at barebacking. The Pride Series will begin with a Women Only night on April 1 call Lavender Lives on Stage and will include a Lesbian Theater Initiative that will host Holly Hughes in Preaching to the Perverted and the American premiere of Australian Gina Schien's comedy, Relative Comfort. A Real Read will produce Time Traveler, an African American GLBT history in a game show format, and an all star staged reading of the first gay

play performed in Chicago, Henry Blake Fuller's At Saint Judas's, first performed in 1897.

The insectually obsessed playwright Douglas Carter Beane is doing double duty locally. As Bees in Honey Drown gathers pollen at Northlight Theatre while his Advice from a Caterpillar will be cocooning it at Grassroots Theatre Company.

Pardon me myth, but I've never done thith, with a real live girl: Also doing double duty is Xena, that mythological Amazon of lesbian chic, in Xena Live, the first in a series of adventure tales penned by Claudia Allen and co-produced by About Face Theatre and Greasy Jones & Company. Taking a cue from the gum commercial, her pleasure gets doubled when she is magically split into both Xena Warrior and Xena Lover. This show has been running long enough to become a legend in its own right. Then About Face will continue by courting controversy with the American premiere of Four, a risky new play about a quatrain of people on guess which day of July. Christopher Shinn's drama concerns a teenage boy, the African-American university professor he meets on line, the professor's daughter and the boy who loves her, and it will open in the U.S. for the first time following its critically-acclaimed premier at London's Royal Court Theatre.

Finally, on a sad coda, Chicago actor Ted Bales, who was so memorable as the gay priest in Party here and everywhere, passed away February 10th. He will be sorely missed.

Christian Bale (Velvet Goldmine) stars along with Jared Leto (My So Called Life) and Guinevere Turner (Kiss Me Guido).
- Paul Rudd (The Object of My Affection) will play Nick Carraway, the story's cynical narrator in A&E's remake of F. Scott Fitzgerald's 'The Great Gatsby'. Mira Sorvino will play Daisy Buchanan for this production scheduled to air in 2000.

The story is about a gay man masquerading as heterosexual to boost his career. Beane is best know for the script to the film To Wong Foo, Thanks for Everything, Julie Newmar. In my book, that's nothing to brag about!
- Matt Keeslar's (Waiting for Guffman) career is booming and not because he got to kiss Johnathon Schaech in the movie Splendor and Dan Futterman in Sundance Film Fest entry Urbania. If you can't put the face to the name you will soon. The about-to-be designated Hollywood hearthrob is in Scream 3, then costars with James Van Der Beek in Texas Rangers, followed by the comedy thriller Psycho Beach Party, based on the off-Broadway play.
- SF's Lumiere Theatre recently showed the Richard Morris documentary film Wallowitch & Ross: This Moment. The movie reviews the three-decade Gay and professional partnership of New York cabaret entertainers John Wallowitch and Bertram Ross.

open-air theatre offered all-male productions of Shakespeare's works. This year's schedule features a production of The Tempest featuring Vanessa Redgrave as Prospero. A casting action unique, not only for assigning such a role to a woman but due to the fact that Redgrave's father played the same part at the Royal Shakespeare Company 50 years ago.

Original Chorus Line cast member, Donna Drake, directed the show that is based on Edward Swift's 1978 novel. The story centers on Timothy John Coldridge who leaves Splendora, TX, returning in a form more easily accepted by the natives, as Miss Jessica Gatewood, a woman who runs the county bookmobile.
- Tales of the City author, Armistead Maupin is putting the finishing touches on his next novel Night Listener. Though it features some autobiographical material, the story centers on a fiftysomething Gay San Francisco writer.
- B.D. Wong (And the Band Played On) appears in an upcoming off-Broadway production of Oedipus Rex starring Al Pacino. This latest version of the Sophocles tragedy also stars Dianne Wiest, David Strathairn, and Ruby Dee.
- British comedian Eddie Izzard (Dressed to Kill), is touring his new show Circles before making his Big Apple debut in April.
- All 19 of Samuel Beckett's dramatic works will be filmed for British and Irish television under a collaboration between Film Four and the Irish broadcaster, RTE. The project is reported to include directors Neil Jordan (The Crying Game) and Tom Stoppard alongside actors like John Hurt, Judi Dench and Julianne Moore.
- VHS and DVD versions of the Broadway musical Victor/Victoria, starring Julie Andrews will be released in April. The recording was made using "state-of-the-art high definition equipment and will have Dolby Digital 5.1 multi-channel sound." The DVD version will be letterboxed and will contain a Julie Andrews biography and filmography.

#### "DO US"

"Fabulous!" "A small theatrical gem!" "Full of beauty and pain." If these raves were gathered by a mainstream play, the following would happen. The play would be published by Samuel French, it might receive, according to an often produced friend of mine, a 100 productions, and if timely, be revived every 5 or 10 years, like the fluff HAY FEVER to the tough ICEMAN COMETH. It is incidental that those raves were given to one of my plays. They might as well have been earned by one of my fellow pioneers in gay theatre in the '60s,' 70s and early '80s: Richard Hall, Arch Brown, Doric Wilson, Jane Chambers, the brilliant Robert Chesley and a handful of others trying to dramatize the gay experience before Stonewall.

If we were reviewed, if at all, the papers that reviewed us were not taken seriously -- we were not, as a rule, Equity, our plays were "disposable," seen once or twice and forgotten, save for the few whose lives were changed by our "out" attitudes. When Dialogus, the potential gay Samuel French was born, printing three of my works THE WING BENEATH MY WINGS, THE GOOD TIME BOYS, and VIDEO'S CHILD and brought out a catalog containing some of the

most prolific gay writers of our time, I thought "thank you St. Dennis," patron saint of drama, we would get "done." Dialogus folded due to lack of interest among established gay theatres (and The Purple Circuit shows us how great is the number compared to my debut).

Gay producers were unaware what peerless documents of Gay/Lesbian history we have left behind. Unless there is an established Gay theatre or producer who will look back at us as some producers here in NYC who do a season of one playwright's past works, we shall fade away as surely as all interest in any plays dealing with our still and present danger, AIDS.

Is no one interested in who paved the way for TORCH SONG or JEFFREY or ANGELS or even "Ellen?" In those of us whose only reward was reaching out to our Gay brothers and sisters, dramatizing "Gay is GOOD" long before Larry Kramer or McNally or Kushner captured mainstream press?

Those who were brave enough to "come out" in the '60s with our personal insights into the pain and the joy of same/ sex love, certain no film or TV unit would touch our "revolutionary work?" Unlike Terry Miller and Chambers and Hall and sweet Chesley, some of us veterans of gay theatre still write but are treated as newcomers by new young producers who never heard of us! Well, we are in whatever remains of the Dialogus catalog and in the heart and hands of our keeper of the flame, Bill Kaiser!

Come on, welcome in the merging new hot Turks of Gay experience but don't let our theatrical history begin with TORCH SONG (or truly uninformed historians who write about gay theatre history and never heard of Doric Wilson's ground-breaking '70s company TOSOS and forget Chesley's dynamite STRAY DOG STORY). While there is still time, before our scripts end up as dead as we are, DO US!
