- S.F. Bay Area Filmmakers David Weissman and Bill Weber are putting together a documentary on the hippie era drag group, the Cockettes. The group of frequently bearded men danced and sang their way across stages of San Francisco and included late disco singer Sylvester among it's members. The producers have gathered an extensive array of photos and film clips to use in the documentary.
- A staging of the 1924 **Leopold and Loeb** murder trial, "Never the Sinner," was presented by Portland, Oregon's Artists Repertory Theatre on Jan. 14-Feb. 25. The play's author, **John Logan** has written screenplays for the film "Any Given Sunday," "Gladiator" and is working on the next Star Trek feature film.
- The Canadian Stage Company of Toronto will produce a new musical version of the 1977 cult film "Outrageous" for their upcoming season. The film version featured **Craig Russell** as the female impersonator who befriends a schizophrenic woman in Toronto.
- Rocker Melissa Etheridge is getting ready to hit the road but not for another concert tour. The singer is readying a one-woman show about her life and plans to bring it to Broadway just after the New Year. The show would contain music and recollections.
- The concept choral concert exploring gay urban life in the 20th century, "A Gay Century Songbook," the concept choral concert performed last Spring at Carnegie Hall was recorded and has been released on CD. The theme, as performed by the New York City Gay Men's Chorus, focuses on gay urban life in the 20th century. The project features lyrics and libretto by **Michael Korie** who previously wrote the lyrics to the contemporary opera "Harvey Milk."
- "The Laramie Project," **Moises Kaufman's** docudrama about the 1998 murder of gay college student **Matthew Shepard**, is coming to television as an HBO movie. Kaufman, who co-wrote and directed the Off-Broadway drama, will write the screenplay. The original theatrical version followed members of a theatre group who travel to Laramie, WY, where Shepard was beaten, to observe the community before developing a play.
- Barbra Streisand will appear only behind the camera for the upcoming three-hour TV version of Jerry Herman's 1966 musical, "Mame." Joining Streisand in producing the show are Craig Zadan and Neil Meron with a broadcast date pointing at the 2001-2 television season. The duo previously worked on the TV musical renditions of "Annie" and "Cinderella."
- HBO has a quirky new drama from the pen of Oscar-winner Alan Ball (American Beauty) coming this summer. It's called "Six Feet Under" and centers on the Fisher family who run a mortuary in LA The cast includes Peter Krause (Sports Night), Richard Jenkins (Me, Myself & Irene) and Lauren Ambrose (Can't Hardly Wait). Some of the 13 committed episodes will be directed by Miquel Arteta (Chuck & Buck), Kathy Bates, Lisa Cholodenko (High Art) and Ted Demme (Beautiful Girls).
- Bryan Batt, who originated the role of Darius in both stage and film versions of Paul Rudnick's "Jeffrey," is in the new Broadway hit "Seussical the Musical." Though he's only standby for the Cat in the Hat. The show's producers felt it necessary to call it Suessical the MUSICAL so people wouldn't confuse it with Suessical the epilatory cream.
- Actor **Ethan Sandler** one-man show, "Fully Committed," left it's recent LA home for a National Tour, which kicked off at Washington DC's Ford Theatre on Jan. 25. Is it tacky to use the words "kicked off" and "Ford Theatre" in the same sentence? The show is noteworthy in is similarity to "Greater Tuna," as Sandler plays all the characters both male and female. Among the quirky roles are a hit

man, a wealthy social dame, supermodel, Wall Street Tycon and a Head Chef, described as the Hannibal Lechter of the kitchen.

"Southern Baptist Sissies," Del Shores' play, a commercial and critical hit at Southern Cal's Zephyr Theatre on Melrose, was extended indefinitely. The amusing coming-of-age tale about four gay men raised in the Baptist church was both a commercial and critical hit

Consequently, a film version of Shores' play "Sordid Lives" is about to be released and features much of the cast from "Southern Baptist Sissies." Among his upcoming projects is a Showtime cable film starring **Olivia Newton-John**.

- The long awaited film version of the Broadway musical "Chicago" is on again. This time, director/ choreographer Rob Marshall has been hired by Miramax to direct with a screenplay by Oscar-winner Bill Condon (Gods and Monsters). Marshall is best know for having directed and choreographed the recent TV version of "Annie" and the Broadway productions of "Kiss of the Spiderwoman" and "Victor/Victoria." In 1997, Miramax announced that the movie version would star Madonna as Velma Kelly and Goldie Hawn as Roxie Hart. That fell through and then the studio brought on Gay director Nicholas Hytner (The Object of My Affection) with a screenplay adapted by "M*A*S*H" veteran Larry Gelbart. Needless to say, that one also fell apart.
- A revival of Noel Coward's "Design for Living," debuted at NY's American Airline's Theatre on March 15. Directed by Joe Mantello, the production stars Tony Award winner Alan Cumming (Cabaret), Jennifer Ehle (Wilde) and Dominic West (28 Days). Written by Coward in 1932, the timeless comedy follows three decadent artists on a search for true love through London, Paris, and New York. But that's not all. A 1926 Coward play, which wasn't produced until 1977, will finally reach London. "Semi-Monde" will hold forth at the Lyric Theatre on Shaftesbury Ave., beginning March 7. Philip Prowse, artistic director of Glasgow's "Citizens' Theatre" who staged the 1977 premiere returns as both director and designer. The play is set during Coward's golden era of the Art Deco period and takes place in a cocktail bar at the Ritz Hotel. Gay actor and former Alfred Hitchcock film star, Farley Granger, will make his West End Theatrical debut in this production.

Quentin Crisp's Ghost on the Great Purple Way

Sadly, Quentin Crisp never got to see Resident Alien, the bitchy biographical play about him created by London's Bush Theater. Crisp did journey to the U.K. to catch it in 1999, but he died just days before attending the show.

Happily, the New York Theatre Workshop recently addressed that tragedy by bringing Resident Alien — if not to Crisp — at least to the neighborhood where he presided as literary queen and gay guru throughout his later years: Manhattan's funky East Village. Bette Bourne came with the production and reprised his role as the fey man who loved face powder and lived to shock. ("Sex smudges your makeup!" he warns the audience at one point in the show, causing butch leatherboys to gasp.)

Bourne and the play's recreation of Crisp are so good that the show is downright creepy. When Crisp died at the age of 90, a key question was left unanswered: was he a true literary genius or just a favorite gay freak show of his day? His literary reputation is certainly suspect. It rests chiefly on one thin volume, The Naked Civil Servant, which recounts his travails as a persecuted sissy in 1920s-60s England. Resident Alien quite honestly informs us that Crisp was no lover of les belles-lettres. Forget all of Crisp's naughty tales of broken hearts and sordid sex: this play's most shocking revelation is that gaydom's beloved literary icon despised reading books!

But that didn't stop Crisp from accumulating hundreds of them, which were sent to him by authors eager to get endorsement quotes for their dust jackets. Crisp simply refused to throw anything away and in Resident Alien we see him buried under a lifetime of junk in his filthy, one-room apartment where neighbors taunted him with loud rock music blasted through thin walls and dead mice dropped through his front-door mail slot.

"I can never remember a time when I wasn't laughed at," he says, poignantly to the audience. "I always pretended I knew what they were laughing it." But its clear that Crisp, as portrayed hauntingly by Bourne, never got the joke. It didn't matter. Bourne reveals Crisp to be a gem shining amidst the debris of his apartment and the garbage of mankind beyond his door. In the end, it's Crisp who gets the last laugh as he retells how he survived 90 years of anti-gay persecution with shrewd antics and unflagging wit. The cruel, straight world may have loved to slap this sissy down at every turn, but Resident Alien shows that Crisp, limp wrist or no, knew how to strike back. The Irish Repertory Theatre's production of The Importance of Being Oscar (Jan. 28-Mar. 4) isn't the gay old time that the play's title suggests. It's about Oscar Wilde, but, frankly, there's nothing wild about the handling of "The Love That Dares Not Speak Its Name."

In fact, the play fails to speak up much about that love. The whole reason that Wilde gets hauled off to Reading Goal in the second act is mostly hinted at with winks and nods. The reason: it was written in the 1960s by Michael MacLiammoir, who performed it at Dublin's Gaiety Theatre (what irony!), then brought it to Broadway where it received enthusiastic reviews five years before the Stonewall Riots 40 blocks downtown. Now The Importance of Being Oscar is revived in honor of the centenary of Wilde's death and it's capably performed by noted Irish actor Niall Buggy, who was last seen on Broadway in The Weir. Buggy looks (and acts) too much like Sir John Gielgud to try and impersonate Wilde too often. Wisely, he sticks mostly to narrating the scribe's life and reciting portions of his best works (The Importance of Being Ernest, De Profundis, The Picture of Dorian Gray). The play may be sexually stingy, but it's artistically rewarding. Irish Repertory Theatre, 132 West 22nd St.; 212-727-2737.

I didn't see Kit Marlowe at the Public Theater in Nov.-Dec., but I offer this report based on Variety's review, which was penned by Charles Isherwood. The play about the notorious gay-blade dramatist Christopher Marlowe, written by David Grimm, got a mixed notice, but Isherwood noted that "Marlowe's general uproariousness and flagrant homosexuality give the play a distinct contemporary edge."

The show is brazenly homoerotic from the start — when Marlowe (portrayed by studly Christian Camargo) arrives on stage naked and dangling from a rope swing.

"The central drama derives from the murky rumors that Marlowe was a spy working to uncover treasonous plots against Queen Elizabeth," Isherwood added. "There's a torture scene, a hanging and much knife play, as well as some druggy encounters with Sir Walter Raleigh and his band of free-thinking associates. Throw in a few homoerotic encounters and you've got quite a show, even if it can't be taken too seriously."

TANTA Productions presents the SF premiere of a new dark comedy by Tom Vegh. "Toto, we're not in Starbucks anymore!" Cafe Depresso, more a state of mind than a cyber Java joint, is peopled by a spitfire real-estate broker, a gay travel agent, a 30-something lesbian with AIDS and a Hungarian engineer, plus a panoply of San Franciscans. Dawson Moore directs the production. This dark comedy follows four San Franciscans in group therapy for depression as they encounter an onslaught of change and surprise when two group members disappear. Two patients are missing the evening we join the group — Tanner, an unemployed C.P.A. and Anna, a retired librarian. Within the first few minutes, we learn it is very likely that Anna has committed suicide and Tanner thinks he may have killed someone. He reveals that a dead body is hanging out of his Beemer Z-3's passenger door. Cafe Depresso is also inhabited by the late Anna's niece, a bewildered young woman who's fallen off the turntable of Generation W and finds herself in charge of Anna's estate; Roderigo, the cafe's espresso-infused waiter/artist-inresidence; Dante, the haughty sales representative for the Fujitsu Cyber-Sex Boutique and others.
