CHICAGO SCENE

Happy spring everyone! I hope love is in the air for all!

A One Man Army: In March, About Face Theatre presented the world premiere of the Obie Award-winning play, Another American: Asking and Telling. Performed by Marc Wolf and directed by Joe Montello, the real words of 18 individuals are heard on all sides of homosexuals in the military issue. Wolf transformed himself into all his subjects — men, women, gay, straight — to give us a chilling picture. His talent was highlighted in the rapid transitions between two elder military lesbians sitting at a bar. The emotions ranged from the playful camp of an effeminate soldier who boosted the morale and saved the lives of his Vietnam platoon, to the heart wrenching words of the mother of seaman Allen Schindler who was beaten to death by his shipmates. A very impressive evening of theatre!

Xena Sings! This spring, About Face also presents Xena Live! Episode 2: The Musical, the follow-up to 2000's Episode 1. Both are written by lesbian playwright Claudia Allen (a Victory Gardens ensemble member) based on the TV series. Elizabeth Laidlaw and Amy Matheny return as everyone's favorite princess warrior and sidekick Gabrielle, respectively. Filled with thrilling stage combat and loads of laughs, the Live! shows have been enjoyed by both hardcore fans and casual late night channel surfers alike.

LAFing at the Bailiwick: This spring, Bailiwick Repertory and the Lesbian Theatre Initiative have teamed up to present the 1st Annual Lesbian Arts Festival. Running through June, the series presents evenings of short plays, music, staged readings, poetry, and stand up comedy. Topics range from history to love to psycho therapy to a woman who "finds out her aura indicates she's been inadvertently feeding an ancient vampire goddess." Huh.

Miller Time: Queer performance artist and one fourth of the "NEA Four," Tim Miller spent some time in Chicago in March. In residency at Roosevelt University, he performed for two nights at the Bailiwick to kick off his book, a collection of monologues called Body Blows. I'd never seen him live before and was thrilled. He did two older pieces including the story of his first date with a guy in high school. Then he presented a new piece about the Bridge of Love in Niagara Falls and the publicized problems he and his Australian partner are facing with the INS. I got the chance to meet him afterwards (and ask the question Ernie, my friend Sarah, and I had been trying to figure out all day — Who was the fourth NEA Four?) When I told him I was a playwright, he wrote in my copy of his book, "Tell your stories!" Encouraging words that countered Larry Kramer's advise to me: "Stick to novels."

Naked Boys, Naked Words, & The Bible: Bailiwick's Naked Boys Singing keeps going despite my reports of its March closing. Set to close in June. In the middle of Pride? Somehow I don't believe it.

Bailiwick presented Word Made Flesh, an exploration of sexuality and spirituality. Catholic lay minister Michael Maher used biblical texts and the works of Michelangelo for inspiration. Scarves, paint, and plenty of flesh covered the stage to turn the Bible into theatrical poetry. Chicago Reader critic, Brian Nemtusak, described the show as "a singularly strange experience." Closed April 14, 2002. Keeping with biblical twists, the Bailiwick presents through May the Chicago premiere of The Most Fabulous Story Ever Told. This off-Broadway hit is Paul Rudnick's take on the history of civilization that begins with the idea of "What if God really did start with Adam and Steve and not Adam and Eve." The production stars David Davita, and Corpus Christi alum, Stephen Rader, as well as Jennifer Wilson, and Kelli Strickland as Jane and Mabel.

A One-Woman Army: Corn Productions presented their take on the one-woman show, Just Playing Me, the story of Jeremè Cullens. An aging music and TV star, Jeremè makes her triumphant return to the stage (along with her four cuteypatooty backup boys) to tell her story. She sings her way through the many phases of her career: country western starlet, a gospel singer and Tammy Faye-esque preacher's wife, a punk rocker, and more. She also performed her own Vagina Monologue. Written by Robert Bouwman and Todd Shaner, the brains behind "Tiff & Mom."

Execution Revival: Hyper-World Theatre presented Emily Mann's Execution of Justice, the docu-drama of the 1978 assassinations of Harvey Milk and SF mayor George Moscone by Dan White. While an important story to tell, reviewer Albert Williams felt that 24 years since the events, the play needs a stronger sense of context to grab today's audiences. Strong performances also bend sympathy to White's personal tragedy that lead to his actions. A sad tale that overshadows the loss of two of our strongest leaders.

Pride is Coming! As we go to press, Pride events will be underway all over the country from bars to music to theatre, including Bailiwick's Pride Series and projects by the New Town Writers. A full recap next time.

Happy Pride and come see my play, The Melted Lampshade at the Playwrights Center of Minneapolis, June 7-16.

SODOM EAST: NEW YORK On the Great Purple Way

"Speed-Hedda" zoomed into Manhattan like a whirlwind in Jan./Feb. and - yikes - Ibsen would gulp a few dolls if he saw his Ms. Gabler now! Here she's a pill-popping suburban housewife swept up in her tragic destiny when an old flame comes to town. The Fabulous Monsters Performance Company made its Manhattan debut when it brought the hit romp by Robert Prior to LaMaMa. 'Twas a great success.

MORE ON CAMP: "Lesbian Pulp-O-Rama" is going on, and on — just like the pop pulp books that it spoofs. After reaping raves at last summer's Queer@HERE Theater Festival, "Pulp" just had a new installment at HERE: more outrageous lesbian vignettes ("Reformatory Girls," "Orgy at Sea") that are just as popular with fey guys as lesbos because of their gothic silliness. Expect more installments soon.

It's always noteworthy when Wings Theatre chief Jeffery Corrick takes a side step to direct a show on his own stage. This time — oo-la-la! — it was "Tango Masculino" by Clint Jefferies. Corrick's best move: casting dreamy dancerturned-actor JoHary Ramos, who seduces the audience as a secret maricon swept off his feet by a thug in butch 1920s Buenos Aries. Corrick stages their tangos soooo sensuously (ha! cha! cha!) that the audience pants to the music while lines form at the box office. "Tango" is Wings' biggest hit in some time. www.wingstheatre.com

The success of "Street Theater" is great news for pub theater! The Stonewall play just reprised the kind of staging it used to have back in the 70s & 80s: in cheap bar space. The new production extended its run at the Eagle in Chelsea by three weeks, proving that saloons are great settings for drama (even of the non-cruising kind). MINNEAPOLIS SCENE by Steven LaVigne

As the ice sculptures of the Winter Carnival melted across the street, the orchestra was the star of Minnesota Opera's LA CLEMANZA DI TITO at the Ordway. Never have they sounded better as they played Mozart's baroque score. Written in Italian, not German, just prior to his masterpiece, THE MAGIC FLUTE, and produced six months before his death, this study of the Roman Empire's most open-minded ruler should have been an exciting event. However, stage director Steven Lawless' uninspired direction, while fueled with beautiful pictures, did little to stimulate the audience. Lawless' ancient Rome, in a production design borrowed from Dallas. resembled the Renaissance. Three women, two of them in trouser roles, held the stage, while its leading character, entering with much ado, sang little and was supposedly murdered before the interval. (I can't account for Act 2, because I didn't stay for it.)

It's cramped and audiences are crowded into their seats, but in less than a decade, the Bryant Lake Bowl has gone from being the trendiest place to see offbeat theater, to just another place offering a quirky night out. As long as the Minneapolis Musical Theater remains its first resident company, I can live with the cramped conditions. They really use the space well and continue to challenge audiences with their choice of material. Their latest outing is WEIRD ROMANCE, a pair of one-act musicals "of Speculative Fiction," that's a treat for everyone.

Act One, THE GIRL WHO WAS PLUGGED IN, puts us into a futuristic world where advertising is illegal. A large corporation, GTX, "grows" its own stars and puts them into productions such as an "OUR TOWN set on the Third Moon of Jupiter." Product placement is vitally important as the performers are manipulated. They also manipulate the head of the corporation, Dr. Theodore S. Isham, by asking for more money, although it's not clear what they spend it on. You see, these performers are clones, and others give up their existence so these stars can live.

One example is P. Burke, a homeless woman who is transformed into the stunning Delphi. As her career takes off, however, Delphi's body projects P. Burke's humanist attitudes toward life, especially when she dates Isham's son, Paul. The Corporation must stop to such thinking. Directed by Steven J. Meerdink, in what is possibly his finest work, there are several outstanding performances here, specifically from Paul Reyburn as Isham, Gary Geiken as Paul, Kevin Hansen in four roles and Suzanne Reyburn as Delphi.

The real reason this is so terrific is Susan Nickel's performance as P. Burke. Gifted with a clear, lyrical voice, this is one of those singers who renews your faith in musical theater talent, just when you thought it was left to those who can't phrase properly, think through a lyric, or project! Her performance alone is the reason to see WEIRD ROMANCE.

Also, Jay Schueller is to be commended. His set pieces are marvelous, and it's amazing what he does with vacuum cleaner parts. As creatively different as THE GIRL WHO WAS PLUGGED IN is, WEIRD ROMANCE, written by Alan Menken, David Spencer, and Alan Brennert, has its roots in traditional musical theater, especially that of Alan Jay Lerner.

If Act One is basically a Science Fiction MY FAIR LADY, Act Two, HER PILGRIM SOUL, somewhat resembles ON A CLEAR DAY YOU CAN SEE FOREVER. Still set in the world of science, the focus is on Dr. Kevin Drayton, who is programming 3D holographic images into his computer. When a fetus mysteriously appears, we follow the drama of a man in love with "Nola," a reincarnated woman from the past, who's returned to make peace with "her pilgrim soul," so she can, at last rest. The show is charming, as it relates the miniature story of a woman from World War I and into young adulthood. HER PILGRIM SOUL is a rather sweet little piece, and the ensemble, especially Alan Sorenson as Drayton, Deborah Draheim as his wife, Susan Nickel as her associate and especially Suzanne Reyburn as Nola. WEIRD ROMANCE isn't really all that weird. It's a lovely night of nontraditional Musical Theater.

Where does one begin praising HEDWIG AND THE ANGRY INCH, John Cameron Mitchell and Stephen Trask's exquisite musical which took the off-broadway theatre by storm just four short years ago? Does one begin with the excellent, dead-on script? The terrific direction by Jef Hall-Flavin? The outstanding, completely remarkable performance of Jason S. Little in the title role? Seldom have so many elements of theatre come together so successfully into so enjoyable an evening. Even these superlatives seem tame.

Mitchell was a Broadway actor, fresh from his performance as Dickon in the musical THE SECRET GARDEN, when he and his writing partner, Trask, began to collaborate on HEDWIG. They decided to blend their love for rock 'n roll with musical theatre elements to create a rock musical about Hedwig, a transsexual, born Hansel Schmidt in East Berlin. After falling in love with an American G.I., he undergoes a sex change and becomes Hedwig. The operation is muddled, leaving an "angry" inch of skin while the remainder of the wound heals. After being abandoned in a Kansas trailer park, she trains a neighbor boy, Tommy Speck, in rock 'n roll. After stealing material from her, Tommy plays arenas, while Hedwig and her band, The Angry Inch, tells her story performing in dives.

After a long and successful run in New York, Mitchell made an award-winning film version, but it still hasn't reached the cult status of THE ROCKY HORROR PICTURE SHOW. One reason for this is that it brought too much visual reality to a work that's meant to be theatrical. After seeing the Outward Spiral production, it's clear: HEDWIG AND THE ANGRY INCH is a better stage musical. The Minneapolis premiere of this dynamically original work is being performed at the Loring Playhouse, which has been transformed into a cabaret. Opening night brought out a curious audience of glam rockers and gay theatre groupies. Mitchell and Trask have prepared their script so that it's very up to the minute. It's open for improvisational barbs as its multimedia production uses slides to great effect.

Reset tonight in the Loring Playhouse, as Hedwig goes through her opening banter, we learn something of the history of this building, a former garage, with its muscular auto mechanics working on cars. Mitchell manages to use this and other subjects for lots of double entendres, dryly delivered by Little. As she searches for her other half, Hedwig provides reason for her anger. She browbeats Yitzak, her drag queen husband who fears immigration. She also abuses the members of the band. Jef Hall-Flavin has directed this very humane story with a firm sense of humor.

There's never a weak or dull moment, with fine performances from Ann Michels as Yitzak, and the band, featuring Jendeen Brett Forberg, Joe Papke, Desdamona Racheli and Amy Van Patten. Jason S. Little who is simply astounding as Hedwig. From the moment he steps onstage, the show belongs to Hedwig. This is a difficult role, because, through songs and dialogue, Hedwig must show a vast array of emotions. She must also maintain the energy throughout two grueling hours of angst-ridden drama. Little is certainly up to that task. This is an unforgettable performance! HEDWIG AND THE ANGRY INCH was so successful that it was extended twice.

Midwest playwright Lee Blessing relocated to NYC a long time ago, but his play about gay rural life, THIEF RIVER, had its area premiere at the Guthrie Lab in February. This is the study of two men, in love with each other for a half-century. On their prom night in 1948, a twist of fate plunges Gil and Ray into a deep secret that sustains their relationship as the years go on. Gil, who is queer-bashed, attempts revenge and runs to an abandoned farmhouse owned by his best friend, Ray. As Ray helps Gil get himself together, a bum attempts to rob and murder both boys for being "fairies." Ray's grandfather intervenes and offers an ultimatum to the boys.

THIEF RIVER trips back and forth in time, following this couple at three significant times in the lives created by this ultimatum. Gil goes to school and eventually settles in "the cities" (Minneapolis and St. Paul). Ray remains in Thief River, marries, raises a son, and is eventually elected Mayor. In 1973, Gil's brought his lover, Kit to meet his old friend. Unfortunately, it's the day of Ray, Jr.'s wedding rehearsal, disrupted by Kit. At the farmhouse, Ray let's Gil know how he's felt over the years, but when Kit shows one of the letters Ray wrote to Gil (who's saved them all), he, too, becomes the victim of bashing by a Thief River bigot. The last sequence, in 2001, ties the whole thing together.

THIEF RIVER is very much a Midwestern play, clearly written by a Minnesota voice. There are a lot of issues here: violence, harassment, bigotry, resentment, AIDS, unhealed wounds, and aging. The play attempts to put a believable, religious fanatic onstage. However, Blessing has given this play so many awkward twists of fate that much of it rings false. This isn't an easy play to write about, because it's not easily likable. Blessing may be a fine playwright, but he's attempted to write across the decades with characters that are often stereotypes. Too often, the script resembles a male stage version of FRIED GREEN TOMATOES without the wit. The performances of the six versatile actors are splendid, with Richard Ooms, Bard Goodrich, Alex Podulke and William Whitehead especially outstanding. Director Ethan McSweeny does well, but never finds the dynamics he gave to his marvelous LAB production of SIDE MAN.

The April snowfalls that framed the two weekends for the Minnesota Opera's production of LITTLE WOMEN, may have been an omen. Mark Adamo's revision of Louisa May Alcott's Civil War masterpiece has received multiple productions since it's premiere in Houston a few years ago, but what appears onstage leaves much to be desired. It's evident that Adamo hasn't read the book, because his libretto neither respects nor trusts Alcott's writing.

Adamo has eliminated the entire Civil War, thereby depriving audiences of any plot or character development. Too many important, necessary moments are missing. Gone is the development of Jo's relationship with both her family and her friend, Laurie; we never get either Beth's being given a piano by old Mr. Laurence or her visit to the Hummels, where she contracts the Scarlet Fever that will lead to her death. Amy doesn't destroy Jo's journal, and doesn't fall through the ice while skating. We don't get the party where Meg meets Mr. Brooke, and neither Marmee nor Aunt March are important characters. Father isn't taken ill in Washington, D.C., so Jo never cuts her hair so Marmee will have the money to bring him home. So much has been left out, that those unfamiliar with the story won't understand the libretto.

This is especially true when, in Act 2, characters reference aspects of Alcott's book that hadn't been mentioned. Aunt March informs Meg she'll lose her inheritance if she marries Mr. Brooke. She later gives her estate, Plumfield, to Jo, who's been her aunt's companion for many years. Up to this point, it's the first time Plumfield's been mentioned, and it's never addressed again. We never learn that Jo transforms the estate into a writer's colony. There's a brief mention of the Hummels when Beth falls against the piano in Act 2, but the dramatic tension that leads to her death, so beautifully written by Alcott, comes out of nowhere in Adamo.

Many in the audience, especially the children, were deprived of what could be a beautiful operatic interpretation of a great novel. Even LES MISERABLES, while merely scratching the surface at three hours, at least sticks to Hugho's basic lot. Alcott's novel has often been ridiculed, but always bounces back as new readers discover it. If Adamo is to succeed with this work, (which is a half-hour shorter) he needs to examine the story and bring the important character and plot development back into this. Otherwise, Alcott's novel will exist long after the last notes of Adamo's score are played and the work falls into obscurity.

To be sure, the Minnesota Opera production had some outstanding performers who tried to overcome the inadequacies. Deanne Meek as Jo, Adriana Zabala as Meg, John Tessier as Laurie, and Ryan Kinsella as Professor Bhaer are all in good voice and give lively performances, but it doesn't keep this from being a major disappointment!

NOTES FROM LONDON by John Clum

This has been a bumper season for gay drama in London. THE YORK REALIST, Peter Gill's drama of a gay love affair between a young director and a Yorkshire farmer, garnered adulation from the critics and sold out its entire run at the Royal Court. It has moved to the West End for a limited run. A lovely, touching play with two brilliant performances from Lloyd Owen and Richarld Coyle as the lovers. The scene of their negotiation of their first night together is one of the loveliest scenes in gay theater. The romance is doomed, as it always is in British gay drama.

Mark Ravenhill's MOTHER CLAP'S MOLLY HOUSE is not on the same level of excellence, but is delightful. After a successful run at the National, it too moved to the West End. It is a fascinating picture of London gay culture in the 18th century interspersed with less original contemporary scenes. Other playwrights have done better satires of contemporary gay life. Nicholas Hytner's direction is clever and touching.

THE LODGER, now at the tiny Jermyn Street Theatre, offers an interesting picture of gay life in the 50s. A window dresser about to go to trial after being entrapped by a policeman in a public bathroom lives on his memories of a youthful affair with composer-star Ivor Novello. The 90-minute one-man drama is interspersed with Novello songs. The play gives a picture of the role models for young gay men in England at the time: Novello, Noel Coward and John Gielgud. It's not a masterpiece, but worth seeing. American playwright Richard Greenber's tale of a gay baseball player, TAKE ME OUT, will be at the Donmar Warehouse this summer.
