Kudos to the driving force, Frank Barnhart and all his volunteers and sponsors. I actually will be attending the last part of the Festival, which runs September 12-21, 2002. As I prepared this issue, I was astounded by all the festivals that are occurring around the country, Columbus being the newest. I was also impressed with the seasons that are coming up and the anniversaries being celebrated: 25th for Theatre Rhinoceros in San Francisco; 20th for Celebration Theatre in Los Angeles and Bailiwick Repertory in Chicago; and full and diverse seasons at Lambda Players in Sacramento; Buddies In Bad Times in Toronto, Diversionary in San Diego and Richmond Triangle Players to name a few. I am proud of the companies that have grown and matured over the Purple Circuit years.

One issue that is of great importance to me: the relationship between art and activism. I believe that our communities contribute much to that from activist playwrights like Tony Kushner and Carolyn Gage to performers like Tim Miller or Beto Araiza. I believe that plays, performance, music, dance, and comedy can advance progressive ideas of equality, peace, and justice. So I am proud too to know many of these activist artists and of course it is great to be entertained also!

The issue of getting plays produced is an ongoing one for playwrights and producers alike. John Clum has mentioned that published plays have a better chance of being produced. Yet Francine L. Trevens tells me of the closing of small bookstores due to e-business like Amazon taking the sales. Incidentally, her publishing firm T'n'T Classics sells directly and through Gay bookstores only and yet those bookstores will not even order with special discounts.

World AIDS Day is approaching December 1st and the AIDS pandemic which took a generation of our cultural world is still with us and wrecking havoc in Africa, Asia and around the world. CHICAGO SCENE by Michael Van Kerckhove

Pride 14: It's summer, it's Pride, its Bailiwick Repertory's 14th Annual Pride Series. It's also a leaner roster than in past years, a choice made to focus more energy on fewer productions (plus those singing *Naked Boys* are still taking up one of the stages.) Here's a run down of this year's offerings.

Scott Capurro's *Fucking Our Fathers* kicks off the series. The play follows two 40-year-old men as they journey from their younger party boy selves into the realm of mature father figure types. They still want their muscle daddies, but realize that's a role meant for them now. (Through June 30)

Robert Canning's *Ice/Age* makes its world premiere. Written for the Stonewall Generation, it's the story of Frank and Wes (who have been together 27 years) and their friends as they

play poker, dish, and discuss life, love, and the inevitable end. (Through August 4)

Nifty, developed by Scott Lee Heckman, features staged readings of erotic gay stories. (Through August 25)

Del Shores' Southern Baptist Sissies makes its Chicago premiere after successful runs in LA and Dallas. A comingof-age story about growing up gay and Baptist in the deep South. (Through September 1.)

20, developed by Stephen Rader, was inspired by his visit to the Chicago display of the AIDS Quilt. He set out to fill the absence of modern HIV/AIDS plays by asking a diverse group of gay men 20 questions about love, sex, Bea Arthur, and more. (Through September 8)

Chuck Ranberg's Off-Broadway hit, *End of the World Party* makes its Chicago premiere. The play follows a group of men who spend their summers on Fire Island. Instead of the wild abandon of summers past, this year, they focus on love and friends — the ones they are with and the ones they've lost. (Through September 8) <u>bailiwick.org</u>

Each year, a group of 14 to 20-year-olds puts together a show based on their experiences. This show included a bit on the anxiety over public restrooms, the story of a Jamaican boy seeking asylum, and the poetry of a fabulous Latina lesbian in black leather pants. Funny, touching, and extremely honest, Ernie and I wanted to adopt them all.

The show is also the last in their current home, the Jane Addams Center. The Center was purchased by a developer and will most likely be torn down. The theatre has in the past housed Bailiwick, Famous Door, and Steppenwolf, among others. Gary Sinise, Laurie Metcalf, John Malkovich, and David Schwimmer have all graced its stage. About Face will be itinerant for at least the next two seasons before the planned residency at the new GLBT community center on Halsted that is now in development. aboutfacetheatre.com

Working up a Sweat: On June 20, The NewTown Writers presented Working Stiffs ... stories and songs about queers on the job... The show was presented in the un-AC'd loft

space of the Bailiwick — but the turn out was amazing. I performed my monologue, "The Two Turns of Table 12: A Waiter's Tale." I went first — so no one was deliriously hot yet. The group also presents *Off the Rocks* celebrating 20 years of Chicago's gay literary tradition. newtownwriters.org

A *Beautiful* Night: Famous Door Theatre Company has remounted its award winning production of Jonathan Harvey's *Beautiful Thing* (which later ran Off-Broadway). The original cast was back for a weekend run at Theatre on the Lake (a wonderful summer-in-Chicago institution.) In the final scene, when Ste and Jamie slow dance to "Dream a Little Dream," I particularly missed Ernie, who's teaching in Michigan this summer. The Pride of Pride Shows: "Lesbian Pulp-O-Rama"

"Lesbian Pulp-O-Rama" is now officially a hit-o-rama poised to become a gay classic. The cheeky spoof of those 1950s paperbacks that depicted dykes as bug-eyed deviants hellbent on seducing innocent maidens returned to the Queer@Here Festival for Gay Pride month slightly tweaked and retooled after its acclaimed debut last year.

The reasons it still generates deafening bravos and huzzahs: (1) it's so smartly written that it appeals to highbrow critics, (2) so hilariously campy that it's cheered by homos and str8s alike (imagine skits titled "Reformatory Girls" and "Sondra Stingray: Girl Gumshoe") and (3) so cheap to stage (minimal costumes and virtually no set) that it's a blessing-o-rama to producers. Other highlights of the June festival included: solo video/theater work "Touchscape" by James Scruggs (about the promiscuous sex life of gay men), "A Pair of Hands: Deaf Gay Monologues" by Raymond Leczak (vignettes set in

Manhattan, 1975 to today), and "The Mystique of Fly" by Leslie Duprey (poetry by lesbians of color). Once again the Genesius Guild unveiled a new comedy for Pride -- this year "Just Us Boys" by Frank Stancati, about five bitchy lads who share a dressing room while dancing in a Broadway tuner, "Depression," that looks like a real downer but ends up sweeping the Tonys. The backstage backstabbings depicted are based on the true experiences of its author, who hoofed it in "Sugar Babies," "Annie" and "42nd Street." More info at www.genesiusguild.org

Fans of playwright Sidney Morris celebrated Pride by attending a selection of his theater works, "Hot Mamas and Gay Boys," on June 17 at the Aurora on West 57th Street.

Preposterous but true: There actually existed a provocative play -- with a prominent gay subplot -- by str8 super-writer John O'Hara that was never produced. The Peccadillo Theater Company corrected that outrage by staging "Veronique," about rot gut-swilling, sex-crazed bohemians in 1920s Greenwich Village. The plot is absurd by today's standards (a writer gives up a fortune because he doesn't want to be "tainted") and the portrayal of gays is offensive (so much swishing it whips up a windstorm in the theater), but the dialog glows like a treasured chestnut. Bank Street Theater July 14-August 4, 2002.

Other notable productions:

"A Letter from Ethel Kennedy" — In May, the MCC Theater staged this a play-within-a-play about a middle-aged TV exec, who tries to reconcile with his parents before he dies of AIDS. It was penned by Christopher Gorman, who died in 2001. Curiously, a str8 role was played by "Queer as Folk" star Randy Harrison.

"Boys and Girls" — A new play by Tom Donaghy about two lesbians who ask their best friend — a dysfunctional gay man who pines to reconnect with his alcoholic ex-lover — to move in with them and be a father figure to their infant boy. Presented by Playwrights Horizons at the Duke Theater in May and June.

"Tales Told" — Two non-gay one-acts "with a gay subtext" staged by TOSOS II, including "Penny Penniworth," about a third-rung British theater company presenting a "lost" Charles Dickens work. Performed in June at the West End Theater at the Church of St. Paul and St. Andrew.

MINNEAPOLIS SCENE

Discovering the roots of today's composers and lyricists is a genuine treat, especially with such talents as Stephen Flaherty and Lynn Ahrens. Before they set Shakespeare's star-crossed lovers ONCE ON THIS ISLAND, and captured the music within E. L. Doctorow's masterpiece, RAGTIME, this duo created a musical based on Michael Butterworth's novel, "The Man Who Broke the Bank at Monte Carlo." This spring, The Minneapolis Musical Theatre offered the area premiere of the delightful, LUCKY STIFF at Bryant Lake

The plot's a familiar one: a nebbish stands to inherit a million dollars if he escorts his late uncle's corpse to the European capital for one final spree. The conflict, of course, is that, if he fails, the funds go to an animal shelter, and complications include a box of stolen jewels and an angry, cheating redhead. Most recently, this plot was used for the movie, WEEKEND AT BERNIE'S. The difference, of course, is that the musical is better written, it feels surprisingly fresh and as performed by this outstanding and generally enthusiastic cast, who keeps the spirit of the show truly entertaining, this show is such a treat!

Ahrens' clever and smart lyrics capture the highlights of Butterworth's story, even when her libretto weighs down things a bit, because the exposition takes a while to jell. (After all, this adventure takes place in one day!) Flaherty's score helps to maintain the lively pace and style. It all works if you don't think too much, because it's also a mixed bag of anachronisms.

To begin with, we're never sure exactly what period is this. It should be the 1930s, but it could be the 1950s. The costumes and props are all from different eras. The show demands a delicious Ernest Lubitsch style, as in such films as "To Be or Not to Be," or "Ninotchka." However, director Steven J. Meerkink fails to capture this style and doesn't demand much from anyone, so it's up to the actors to make it work.

And work they do: Jeffrey Cloninger is delightful as the nebbish, Harry Witherspoon, while Tina Miller as Annabel Glick, the love interest is great, because she has one of those musical comedy voices audiences thrill to hear.

Greta Grosch is having a ball as Rita La Porta, the cheating redhead, while Kevin Hansen has found a pleasurable character as her brother, Vinnie. Marlin Rothe, Windy Merrill, Gregg Peterson, Laurie Etchen, Paul Reyburn and Arnie Roos are also excellent.

LUCKY STIFF is the last show the Minneapolis Musical Theatre will perform at Bryant Lake Bowl. They're moving to a larger venue next season. Catch LUCKY STIFF before it leaves, because, as stated above, it's a genuine treat!

There were good reasons to visit the Loring Playhouse during Pride events. Gaydar Productions, the ensemble who

brought us the area premiere of David Dillon's Party, presented a pair of shows worthy of attention. One was better than the other, and neither are standouts against the great works of gay theatre, but they were both pleasant summer theatre diversions.

Billed as a "romantic gay comedy," the area premiere of Steve Kluger's After Dark was sharply written and beautifully acted. The author appears to be telling us that we live in a technologically advanced society and it's placed gay men in a unique position. With gay history so available on the "information superhighway," there's no excuse for any gay man under 40 to confuse Ethel Merman with Esther Williams, which one character does within five minutes of the play's start. Kluger takes a lot of gay clichés to task, including Minnesota's own Judy Garland, and All about Eve.

After Dark is set in an empty, shabby LA diner at 3am, "five days before Christmas," where Ryan, a stuffy lawyer, is working on a case, and drinking warmed-over coffee. The silence is broken when Craig, a boisterous, horny, pseudo-hustler/actor, walks in, talking a mile a minute as he attempts to seduce Ryan. It's an immediate clash of wills as these two men from different gay cultures toss back witticisms galore. (There are a lot of gay references that unfamiliar audiences will miss or won't understand.) At one point, Ryan tells Craig that his gay idealism has "set an entire movement back 75 years."

Recently fired from Disneyland for being caught in a sexual situation with the actor playing "Dopey," Craig's a character similar to Judy Maxwell, Barbara Streisand's character in "What's Up Doc?" He's loaded with lots of useless information which lends the script something of a "gay man's guide to growing up" tone.

Act two takes place five years later, and the two have switched roles. Craig's now a political speechwriter, while Brian is a successful playwright. Their relationship has failed, in part, because, while they know one another, they don't really seem to know one another. As the second act unravels, there's a lot of useless dialogue, and for a while, we wonder if this is what the playwright intended.

Sometimes, the dialogue takes on a Woody Allen-esque tone, too. We learn that the affair fizzled when each man cheated on the other. Then, Ryan reveals that he's HIV+ and this sharp romantic comedy turns into yet another AIDS drama.

As stated above, however, this was still sharply written and beautifully acted. In spite of its numerous flaws, Jairus Abts as Craig and Galway McCullough as Craig, played the material briskly and director Rick Anderson keeps things moving for 90 minutes.

After Dark was paired with the world premiere of This Queer Life, an adaptation of Michael Thomas Ford's gay humor pieces, which have been published in four different volumes. Ford's a difficult writer to enjoy, mostly because his writing is often second-rate. To be fair, This Queer Life was basically a by-the-numbers revue minus much music, that sometimes became refreshingly entertaining, partly because Ford's writing seems better suited to the stage. Among the winning sequences were: "Confessions of A Don't Bee," an hilarious piece on the dark side of Romper Room; "Just One of the

Girls," a comparison of gay male and lesbian pride dances, and; "Queer Cinema," a mini-lesson that dates gay cinema from Bette Davis' appearance in 1935's Dangerous to the video revolution, as it celebrated gay cinematic icons, and "A Better Moustrap," which took on the Christian Right and their attempts to spoil Disney's coffers during the release of Hercules.

When John Flannagan took the lead in "Too much of a Good Thing," his character, Jonathan, became a demented, crosseyed devotee of Martha Stewart. When he lost his job, he needed to join a self-help group. The sad thing about this piece is that, in spite of the sincerity in which was played, there are people like this. Sometimes tedious, often joyous, This Queer Life was very much a mixed bag.

There was a top ten list, and (rather tedious) pieces on gay dating, and gays vs. straights. Some of this material was overlong, and director Anderson relied on his ensemble to enliven the dead spots. If there was a major flaw here, it was that the voices that were really speaking Ford's words were often lost or unrecognizable. It would be advisable to cut the "Dyke the Halls" piece because it's derivative, and only Andravy's poses, more hilarious than the moves or RuPaul, kept this dreary thing moving. Furthermore, it needed more moments like "Changes in My Life" when Andravy opened up to sing. There needed to be more moments to showcase the ensemble's individual talents. While Dan Averitt sometimes had articulation problems and Michael Snyder needed more dimension of character, the ensemble, including Eli Dwver (who resembles gay comic, Elvira Kurt), John Flannagan, Janet Paone, Tammy Shanley, Averitt, Snyder and the remarkable Andravy, made This Queer Life a pleasant, if unremarkable evening of summer theatre.

The Bryant-Lake Bowl, Hey City Theatre and Dunn Brothers Coffee House and Intermedia Arts are all new venues for the Fringe this year. Among the returning production companies are the Marvel Ann Theatre presenting ALL ABOUT STEVE; Rhino Productions presenting Mic Weinblatt's NO SMOKING, NO PETS, NO LOUD SEX; and Ministry of Cultural Warfare's SLAUGHTER HOUSE WARMING. Among the more curious titles are COLOR ME NAKED, MUFFY VON MUNCHAUSEN AND THE FEMININE MISTAKE, THE ONCE AND FUTURE WHORE and SCREWED 3.

The Outward Spiral Theatre will follow up their smash hit, HEDWIG AND THE ANGRY INCH with BRAVE SMILES, ANOTHER LESBIAN TRAGEDY, which is billed as "a comedy by The Five Lesbian Brothers." Directed by Laurie Attea, it plays September 6-21 at the Loring Playhouse.
